It is amazing how a well- tended yard can bring the whole neighborhood alive. Driving along Tilly Mill, coming from or going towards Peachtree Industrial, you are greeted with a picturesque piece of landscaping on the corner of Stonington. Within the last year we have seen red and purple flowers, green edging and several trees appear to offer a welcome greeting to that little corner of Dunwoody North. The landscaping is so simple, yet effective. We asked Jeff Sain, the homeowner, how he came up with ideas for his yard and how he developed a plan. This is what he told us:

"As a Dunwoody homeowner, I know how complex it can be to plan, then execute a new landscape, but it's really easy if you stick to the basics. Don't be afraid take time to visualize the end result. Walk around your property and create zones of areas you'd like to improve in the yard. What helped me was to drive throughout greater Atlanta to see what combinations of trees, bushes and plants the professionals used in their symmetrical designs. I split my project into 3 phases. This helped me get the work completed to see those fantastic results. Using this approach also helped manage the overall budget. Lastly, use good quality products. Go to nurseries with guarantees. You might pay more, but these nurseries tell me it's normal for up to 10-20% of the plants not to survive within the first year. You can take them back and get credit for those spring batch of flowers. Good luck with you new project; you're making our community beautifu!!"

Start planning now for the spring plant exchange. At the plant exchange we ask

gardeners, both those with a green thumb and those who don't know Liriope from Nandina, to bring their extra plants to exchange for plants they need. If you don't have plants to exchange you can make a donation and leave with someone's excess. All donations go to the care and maintenance of the Dunwoody North monuments.

The Yard of the Month Committee is always looking for volunteers to help with the maintenance of the monuments. For more on volunteering please check the Dunwoody North website ("Contact" tab – Beautification).

I had lunch with Sgt. Mike Carlson and our new PIO Officer, Tim Fecht, in mid July. All agreed how quiet it has been in our neighborhood this year until the recent burglary on Laurelwood Road. As you have probably heard by now, the Dunwoody Police caught the burglary suspects in another robbery off of Roberts Drive on September 10th. A neighbor spotted the same black Honda Accord that was described in the Laurelwood break-in and called the police. After a long foot chase, the police took both suspects into custody. There are two other incidents I have been made aware of. Recently a neighbor on Dunhaven came home on a Friday evening about 10:15 to find a suspicious car parked across the street with a woman sitting in it. After ten minutes she moved the car a few houses down. The resident called the Police which resulted in a drug arrest. Thank you Neighbor for looking out for suspicious activity and calling the Police! Another homeowner caught someone going through his mailbox. If you become a victim of identity theft, please file a report with the Police. The Dunwoody Police Department website has an "Identity Theft" section under Community Outreach with links for what to do and who to contact if you become a victim.

I just need your name, phone number and street address. Callingpost is a service which is supported by your annual dues of \$20.00 to the Dunwoody North Civic Association. Callingpost will only call between 9:00 a.m. and 9:00 p.m. If your line is busy, it will continue to reach you up to 14 times.

## Barbara Dodds, A Long Time Civic Association Board Member

Barbara Dodds, 74, of Dunwoody, GA passed away peacefully on June 2, 2012 in Atlanta. She was born in Bonham, Texas on September 18, 1937. Barbara graduated from Orleans American High School in Orleans, France. She was married to Ralph A. Dodds, Jr. on September 1, 1956.

Loved by all who knew her, Barbara was an expert seamstress who passed on her love of sewing and other crafts to her children and grandchildren. She was a long-time officer in the Dunwoody North Civic Association, Dunwoody Homeowners Association and was well known for her community service.

## Gladys Coley, Dunwoody North Civic Association Pioneer

Gladys Coley passed away on March 19, 2012. She and her husband of over 62 years, W. Ray Coley, were the fourth family to move into the Dunwoody North neighborhood, residing in their dream home at 4393 Huntington Circle since 1964.

Gladys created the first roster of Dunwoody North in 1964. This was the start of what we now know as the Dunwoody North Communities Neighborhood Directory.

Dunwoody North neighbors have Gladys and her husband to thank for the installation of our central AC systems in our homes as they fought with their builder to add it as a condition during the construction of their home. At the time, the community was not slated to have central AC installed as a standard, so builders were not offering it. Subsequently, this push forced all future homes constructed within the neighborhood to be built with central AC.

Gladys was a very outgoing individual who never met a person she did not like, and who will be greatly missed by her family and the Dunwoody North Communities.
