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MEDITATION GARDENS - SPIRITUAL RETREAT IN YOUR OWN YARD ...

For most people the primary purpose of a meditation garden is to provide a quiet place where you can renew your body, mind and soul. A meditation garden should be a temporary reprieve from stress and a place where you release tension. To achieve this, you need to let all family members know that the meditation garden is a quiet place where arguing, fussing and fighting are not allowed. You can enjoy your garden alone or invite your kids to bring a book, drawing materials or any other items they enjoy during quiet time.

There are many elements that can be included in a meditation garden to make it your perfect retreat.

- Mater: Water is peaceful and has a calming effect. It is also useful in blocking out noise. A note of caution is that standing water attracts mosquitoes, especially in the summer, so any water that is used should be flowing, as in a fountain.
- Simplicity: Keep your meditation garden simple and clutter free. Study after study has shown that for most of us, clutter causes stress.
- Separation: It is important to create a sense of separation from the rest of the yard. This means clearly marking off a space through the use of hardscaping, paths, etc.

Maintenance: Keep it low maintenance. The last thing any of us needs is one more thing to maintain.

If you are going on vacation, you can go to the Dunwoody Police web site and sign up for vacation watch.

I have noticed that some people wear dark clothing when walking at night. I have also noticed dark colored dogs being walked at night and not wearing light up collars which can be easily purchased on Amazon. Please be safe when walking, use a flashlight and walk facing oncoming traffic.

We have coyotes in our neighborhood so please be careful with your cats and dogs. It breaks my heart every time I get an email of a missing pet.

This has been a very eventful year for many, myself in particular. Our push to provide an updated Directory was confounded by the sudden and unexpected death

of my husband. I want to thank all the dedicated block captains and also the Board members who stepped forward and volunteered to canvas the streets where I had no block captains. I really appreciate everyone's willingness to help out in an emergency. This is really a wonderful neighborhood.

That doesn't mean that no crimes occur here. We have had mailbox pilfering and plundered cars with valuables stolen. Most of the cars had been left unlocked and the mailboxes had had mail placed in them the night before. None of that should matter—we should be able to do those things, but unfortunately times have changed. Consequently, I again urge everyone to take reasonable precautions. Please don't leave valuables visible in your cars, and lock your vehicles and homes, even when you are inside. Put mail out in the daytime, not the night before, particularly if checks are enclosed. Better, drop it in a USPS box. If you see or are the victim of a crime, call 911 and then call me at 404-402-9354.

There are several new developments in Dunwoody. One is the Civilian Police Patrol. They are volunteers who drive around in white Crown Victorias, and they are also the individuals who check your home if you register your vacation with the Dunwoody Police.

The police have also instituted a new program called <u>www.Smart 911.com</u> for which everyone can register to input personal health and home information, so that in the case of a 911 event, the first responders already have a great deal of information before their arrival on the scene.

In addition, there is an opportunity to register for CodeRED mobile alerts which will notify you in the event of a local emergency, like a boil water alert.

The role of the Neighborhood Watch is to inform everyone in the neighborhood about crimes that directly affect us. We do not report missing pets, although if you email the president, she/he can send out an email blast, hopefully with a picture, to everyone who has given us an email address. We do not advise of missing children - that is dealt with by an Amber alert.

We are in the process of updating the CallingPost list and setting up a text messaging system, as well as an enlarged email blast list. The CallingPosts cost almost \$100 per call, cannot include pictures, and can only last 70 seconds. So, if you're wondering why the message seems to go by so quickly, that is your answer. Also, if I'm not informed in a timely manner, there is no point in doing a CallingPost for a single event. The purpose is to get the message out quickly, so the perpetrator may be caught. An email notification system will be ideal as it will allow us to include pictures of lost or stolen objects and the cost is diminished.

However, no notification system can be 100% accurate unless you notify us when you change phone numbers, drop your landline in favor of a cell phone, change your email, or move away. Please help us to help you.

Please keep in mind that the Dunwoody North Civic Association provides the financial support for Neighborhood Watch, so if you are not already a member, please consider joining. We all benefit from the Neighborhood Watch and many other programs that the Civic Association supports.

Joan: We hired a landscape coordinator (Leslie Robson of Dragonfly Landscaping) to help us design and create our garden. We used Leslie about five years ago to put in a Tennessee fieldstone front walk. I explained to her that I wanted a meditation walk on a patch of ground in the backyard where nothing would grow. After bringing in the soil, I laid out the path of the walk with chalk and she dug out the path and lined it with red crushed rock. To keep the space low maintenance Leslie planted mostly perennials...
