

Did you know there are four Facebook groups/pages that cater specifically to Dunwoody North residents?

Whether you're looking for a notary in the neighborhood, a handyman recommendation, some gardening advice, or the owner of an escaped pet, these groups can help connect you with neighbors in the know. Dunwoody North

Neighborhood, Dunwoody North Garage Sale group "the new beginning" and Dunwoody North Garden Club are all private Facebook groups that require you to become a member. Only members can see who the other members are and what is posted. Becoming a member is easy if you have your own Facebook account. If you aren't already on Facebook but would like to take advantage of these resources you would need to set up a Facebook account first.

Dunwoody North Civic Association is a Community Organization page that can be viewed by any Facebook account holder and does not require membership.



Dunwoody North Neighborhood was the brainchild of Cathy Blasdell Iconis and friend Christen Ramo. They set it up in September 2016 and later roped in husbands Mike Iconis and Devin Ramo to help with admin. It was created in an effort to connect neighbors who might not all be members of the Dunwoody North Driving Club. The group is for neighbors 17 years of age and older living in the Dunwoody North Neighborhood and is a forum for people to get

recommendations, request help with a problem, share information, etc. It is secular and non-political and is not intended for buying and selling (see Dunwoody North Garage Sale group below). The group's purpose is to give "the great people of the Dunwoody North neighborhood a place to come together and get to know one another. We are a group with different beliefs and backgrounds, and it is our hope that we can embrace these differences, self-moderate, and get along." To become a member either: 1) have a current neighbor and member invite you to the group. (That member then also needs to send one of the admins a message confirming that you live in Dunwoody North.) or 2) request access to the page and answer the single question "what is your street address?" The administrators use this information to validate that you live in the neighborhood, as a lot of people mistakenly think the group is for anyone on the north side of Dunwoody.

Hello Dunwoody North Neighbors,

Wow, do you get the feeling we are on a roller coaster that's running downhill during an earthquake? It seems like the world is crazier than ever, moving faster than ever, and yet we are still stuck in the expanding quagmire of a pandemic and economic downturn. I can personally attest to this as, over the last few months, more people very close to us have become infected, a long -time friend's dad sadly succumbed to COVID-19 and I've been looking for a new position without success. On the bright side, the longer I live here, the more I realize we really have a great neighborhood.

For 2020 I have been holding the position of DNCA President (pro tem), while also fulfilling my Communications Manager tasks, administering the technology behind the DNCA. This includes things like the website and email back end, our bulk email systems, SMS/MMS text messaging system, and most recently, the Dekalb County COVID-19 vaccination availability monitoring system.

The need to constantly monitor a web site occasionally came up in the past but seeing the frustration of my wife, who is part of the current COVID-19 vaccine Phase 1a+, really got me thinking. For days she had been refreshing the county's web page in the hope of hitting a time when the registration form was available and there were actually appointments to be had. A few hours later, I had a plan and the pieces for monitoring the DeKalb County Board of Health's vaccine page. It took a few days to work out the kinks (again, apologies for the redundant emails) and it is still only semi-automatic, but it works quite well. When one of the DeKalb Health Department's registration / scheduling forms comes available, I get an email notification. I manually confirm the form is really there and then trigger a sending of about 900 emails. Looking at it from both sides, I'm grateful we have a neighborhood organization that has the capability and finances to offer this kind of service and, as a resident, I'm glad my wife was able to take advantage of it and actually make an appointment.

Completely unrelated is the neighborhood's reaction to the explosion just before Christmas. While it's difficult to tease out what was specifically done and given by our Dunwoody North neighbors, the outpouring of support for the afflicted residents of the Dunwoody Village apartments is extremely gratifying.

This is a circuitous way of saying thank you to **you**, our members who support the DNCA with your annual \$20 membership dues. The funds help pay for the many services provided by the DNCA. Payment is not a requirement for membership so, please, register today to take advantage of what we offer (www.DunwoodyNorth.org/Signup) and if you can afford it please send in your \$20 for 2021.

I am on the ballot for 2021 President so if you are something of a web-tech and especially if you are familiar with WordPress, MailChimp, cPanel, PHPList, CSS, PHP and the like, we need you so please consider joining up and helping out.

After being elected, Ted was appointed to serve as Chair of the Operations (OPS) and as a member of the Public Works and Infrastructure (PWI). He will also serve on the Resilience Advisory Board and Large Urban County Caucus with the National Association of County Commissioners (NACo).

Prior to this election, Ted Terry served as the mayor of the most ethnically diverse square mile in America: (Clarkston, Georgia) from January 2014 – March 2020.

As mayor of Clarkston, Ted successfully oversaw the implementation of a \$15 minimum wage for city employees, the decriminalization of simple marijuana possession, an expansion of after school programs, and a commitment for Clarkston to utilize 100 percent clean energy by 2050.


Dunwoody North Garden Club.

From 2019 Scholarship Winner

I was so grateful for the opportunity to participate in the Dunwoody North Scholarship competition last year. The money that I received helped me to attend the University of Georgia, where I experienced the best ¾ of my freshman year that I could imagine before COVID-19 sent us all home. I took wonderful classes, met the most amazing friends, lived in such a cool dorm, and overall loved my first year of college. There are a million stories that I could write in

this article—it would probably fill the whole newsletter. Instead, I am going to share with you an overview of my UGA freshman year experience.

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EXPLOSION AT DUNWOODY VILLAGE

On December 21st, just days before Christmas and the end of a year filled with twists and turns, a terrifying explosion occurred at the Dunwoody Village apartment community. The explosion happened around 4:30 pm and was heard and even felt by many in Dunwoody North and surrounding areas. I thought to myself that it felt like an enormous tree had just been felled somewhere very close by.

Dekalb Fire Rescue and Atlanta Gas Light were on the scene prior to the blast, going door to door evacuating residents after a gas leak was discovered. Miraculously they were able to get everyone out before the explosion but, sadly it was reported that some residents did not have time to retrieve pets from inside their homes before leaving. The source of the leak was later identified as related to a nearby construction project.

The extremely hot fire burned for hours and destroyed the homes and possessions of 10 families before it could be extinguished by DFD.

Two Atlanta Gas Light employees and two Dunwoody Village residents were burned in the explosion and resulting fire. A woman went into labor during the emergency and was also taken to the hospital.

Dunwoody Mayor Lynn Deutsch was also there, helping wherever she could. The following day, a gift card drive was organized by Mayor Deutsch at Malachi's Storehouse, a community outreach of St. Patrick's Episcopal Church. The community showed up in droves to bring donations. Two other local businesses, Soho Office and NFA Burger, also volunteered to help collect donations for the displaced residents.

Given the residents could not re-enter their homes and it was just days before Christmas, Mayor Deutsch encouraged gift card donations so that the victims could purchase familiar items like their favorite toiletries, shoes or clothing items, as well as meals.

The Dunwoody community's outpouring of support amassed cash and gift card donations totaling approximately \$50,000, which also gave these families the opportunity to enjoy some Christmas cheer despite the traumatic and unfortunate event they endured. They were immensely grateful to all of those with giving hearts this past holiday season.

Despite the difficult year our community and our country faced, the response was a beautiful example of how humanity can come together in the wake of tragedy.

This has been especially true this year. I was able to provide timely information with respect to the census, COVID-19, fireworks, and the apartment explosion because of our list. We do not share this information with anyone.

That also includes telephone numbers, as many of you are eliminating your landlines. Please consider joining the Dunwoody North Civic Association to help support all the activities done for the neighborhood. In addition, your \$20 annual dues will also provide you with our latest neighborhood directory. This is very handy when telephone numbers are so difficult to obtain. If you are interested in participating in the Neighborhood Watch as a block captain, which primarily entails the updating


