Recently DNCA sent out a survey to the community and one of the more common requests was to keep Dunwoody North communities beautiful. There are many ways for us all to do that without any cost.

Here are some ideas:

- Do not leave papers in your driveway.
- Make sure your curbs, roof, and driveway

are clear of debris.

- Maintain your yard by cutting your grass, picking up dead limbs, removing dead trees.
- If you are on Facebook, you can join the Dunwoody North Garden Club page. People give away free
 plants that can beautify your yard.
- Follow DeKalb's guidelines for when to roll trash and recycles trash bins to the street. Remember to pull
 them back to your house soon after they've been emptied.
- If you have trailers or boats in your driveway beyond the front plane of your house, please abide by code and move them.
- Per code, do not leave inoperable vehicles on the street or in your driveway and do not park in the yard.
- In consideration of your neighbors, make sure your backyard is maintained as required by code.

Hopefully doing these things will help to keep our community looking beautiful! We love our neighborhood!



Melanie Pearch is the Region 1 Superintendent for DeKalb County School District. If you look at the districts and regions on a map, DeKalb County is divided into seven regions, each with a Regional Superintendent. The Dunwoody Cluster is in District 1, which happens to be in Region 1, the most northern of all the regions. Region 1 also happens to cover almost the same area as District 1 but other regions and districts are quite different.

How does Anna fit into the DeKalb County School District? A Board of Education member is an elected official. The Board of Education (BoE) has seven members, and they have one employee, the Superintendent.

The BoE is responsible for policy while the Superintendent is responsible for day to day operations (masks, virtual learning, inclement weather, etc.). A Regional Superintendent like Melanie Pearch is an employee who reports to the Superintendent.



Some of what will be discussed centers around the Comprehensive Master Plan (CMP), financed by the E-Splost approved in November 2021. The final draft of the CMP will be presented to the Board of Education a week or so before our meeting. This will be fresh information that touches every aspect of our schools --including the physical condition of facilities, how suitable they are for current and future needs as well as demographics, enrollment, capacity, utilization, and more.

If you want to attend the general meeting:

You can attend in person at the DNDC Clubhouse - doors will open at 6:30pm. The meeting will start at 7:00pm so please try and be inside well before then. If you prefer to join via Zoom, please go to www.DunwoodyNorth.org/Meeting to RSVP. Let us know you want to attend so we can plan accordingly. Meeting details are on page 2 of this newsletter and in the included yellow insert.

Also, if you are logged in to your DNCA account, meeting details will be shown on the above web page. Note: This meeting is specifically for the Dunwoody North communities so please do not share the Zoom meeting information.

If you have questions for Anna Hill or Melanie Pearch, please *submit them by email in advance to: Meeting@DunwoodyNorth.org*. During the meeting you can pose questions in the chat box and depending on attendance, you may be able to ask questions live.

For most of the meeting we will mute everyone however we may miss you so please be aware of your microphone setting and assure you are muted when you are not speaking. Closed captioning will be provided during the meeting.

NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH

As the Pandemic continues, most people remain close to home. I have not had any calls about crimes committed in our neighborhood in the last couple of months. Let's hope that continues. If you experience a crime, after you call 911, please call me at

(404) 402-9354.

The criminals, however, are increasingly reaching out through Cyber scams. As always, never hit any links contained within a questionable email. When you get an email that raises your suspicions, the first thing you do is single tap the source of the email in the upper left hand corner. If it doesn't say the same source underneath, close it immediately! For example: I got an email

ostensibly from Amazon confirming my purchase from my Amazon account. I don't have an amazon account. When I tapped the "source" (Amazon), instead of it saying Amazon.com, it had a series of numbers and letters which would have directed me to a totally different email location. BEWARE. This is how criminals get your personal information. Hopefully, people are wising up to these criminals by now, but some people still get pulled in because they sound or look so legitimate. Remember, NO genuine government agency, like the IRS, the courts, or any police department will ever contact you asking you to send money period, especially not in the form of gift cards. Be careful, if you send money in that form, you can never retrieve it.

The Dunwoody Police Department has now instituted a new online portal called P2C which allows residents to directly access events (like incidents and arrests), daily bulletins, community calendars, and register for residential security checks. This portal can be accessed directly from the Dunwoody Police website, or at http://p2c.dunwoodyga.gov.

The only other issues we have been having have been with dead deer in the neighborhood - two in the last few weeks. If you see any dead animals, please call DeKalb County Sanitation at (404) 294-2996 for removal. For wild animal removal, call DeKalb County Animal Control (404) 294-2996.

We caught up with a few of the winners to congratulate them on their awards. The


