NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH

Our neighborhood has been relatively peaceful during this past year, but just a reminder as we approach another

election cycle: removing or vandalizing political signs can constitute theft, criminal trespass and destruction of private property. You can disagree with your neighbors' political opinions, but you have no right to touch their signs.



I haven't received many calls about theft or vandalism which is always a good sign, but as always, if you see a crime or experience one call 911 first, and then please call me at 404-402-9354 so I can issue an alert, if

appropriate. If you don't call me I won't know about it. I have gotten two calls from other neighborhoods regarding how to start and effectively run a Neighborhood Watch, so our work has been recognized. Also, another reminder: if you have surveillance cameras, let the Dunwoody Police know.

We are approaching a new directory year in 2023. I have already requested that all existing block captains update their spreadsheets and have heard back from several requesting replacement spreadsheets or current directories to distribute to new residents. This applies to renters as well. Apparently, there's been a lot of turnover in the neighborhood in the last two years, so we need to update our records. Failure to do so will result in obsolete data being included in the new Directory for the next three years. These Directories are a great benefit to neighborhood residents.

Most people don't realize it, but Neighborhood Watch is our main source of contact information. We do not share this information with anyone; it's strictly for rapid communication with our residents. You can register and update your own contact information directly at our website dunwoodynorth.org. That includes telephone numbers, as many of you have eliminated your landlines.

Please consider joining the Dunwoody North Civic Association to help support all the activities done for the neighborhood, including the Neighborhood Watch. If you are interested in participating in the Neighborhood Watch as a block captain, which primarily involves updating of neighbor contact information, please contact me either by telephone (404-402-9354) or at the website: Neighborhood Watch. Becoming a block captain is a good way to meet your neighbors, but doesn't necessarily require a lot of door to door canvasing, as I provide spreadsheets containing all our current information. We are particularly interested in emails, as that is our principal means of communication.

Hello Dunwoody North Neighbors,

What makes a community? Or perhaps better said, what makes a community desirable?

Over the years, I have traveled a lot. Eastern Europe, Western Europe, North Africa, the list goes on. Since taking a new job last year, I have again been traveling, sometimes to nearby in Atlanta, Tennessee or North Carolina and sometimes farther afield, to places such as Seattle, Los Angeles, and even Santiago Chile.

As I look at these different settings and work with the people who live there, somewhere in the back of my mind I wonder, why is it the way it is, what is it about this place that makes it a good or bad place to live. The bad is sometimes terribly obvious and even painful - disheveled buildings, chaotic streets, abandoned cars, blatant poverty or worse... But even in those places that are impoverished or war-torn, I know it wasn't always like that. So how did it get that way?

Happily, Dunwoody North is not one of those places, in fact, it is really a fabulous place to live but still, if you walk around the neighborhood, which I do pretty much every day, you will regularly see things that make you wonder, why is it like this? My personal preference is not for a finely manicured, perfect neighborhood. I find communities like that too sterile, almost like no one is actually living there but that does not make it OK to, leave garbage cans out for days on end, not pick-up newspapers from the driveway, allow the curbs and gutters to become completely clogged with leaves and branches, leave your yard to grow wildly. Sadly, an inordinate number of the homes with these easy to remedy issues are rental homes but not all are rentals. And really, it should not matter.

As a volunteer community association, the Dunwoody North Civic Association is limited in what we can do to alleviate or eliminate such problems. The DNCA board actually had a fairly in-depth conversation with Dunwoody Councilman John Heneghan to discuss just this. In the early years, Dunwoody North had covenants but they are long since expired. I wouldn't want enforcement of door color and the like but I personally would like to see some basic community regulations. However, enacting new covenants is virtually impossible. What we can do and what we regularly do is point the city and county towards problem properties.

To that end, I want to thank Cindy Dennis for her time as Zoning Vice President. Our Zoning VP, keeps a pulse

on city and county activities as they relate to Dunwoody North and is the point person to help resolve issues in and around Dunwoody North. If you are interested in taking on this role, please let us know. I also want to thank Gerri Penn, most recently for getting a crew together to seriously clean out and trim the Dunwoody North monument area at Binghamton and Tilly Mill. It is a small thing, or at least a relatively small area but how a neighborhood looks makes a huge difference. In addition, pressure was again applied and the area behind the Scott Candler Water Plant on Laurelwood Road is once again cleaned out. We would like to see that area significantly improved but that is a story for another day.

I would like to say to you, our neighbors, take a moment and look at your home from the road. Are the street gutters clean? Does the property look cared for? If not, why not take a bit of time to straighten things out. The sense of pride and accomplishment can be quite fulfilling and even therapeutic. And look around you. Do your neighbor's homes and yards look cared for? If not, try and have a conversation. If that is not successful, please feel free to contact your DNCA.
